INTRODUCTION

This is a short introduction on the stories you will read in the coming weeks and months. These stories are for the entire population but particularly for those blacks who are deficient in their knowledge of the significant contributions that those of our race have contributed throughout the building of this country.

Men such as Dr. Daniel Hale Williams who performed the first heart surgery, Garrett A. Morgan who invented a fire safety hood and also devised the automatically timed traffic light. These men and others like them should be as much a part of us as we are to ourselves. These are black people who have made significant contributions to the fields of science and techology and whose work has gone largely unrecognized. In the words of one of these "hidden contributors" the scientifically talented black person was the "most poignantly tragic intellectual schizophrenic of the first half of the twentieth century. What this means in laymens language, is that these black inventors and scientist were painful and pitiful figures in so far as they had the intelligence and the ability to perform but because of the lack of education, their social/economic conditions and the blatant racism displayed by the society as a whole. However, with great courage and determination they overcame restritive prejudices to contribute significantly in their respective fields.

HIDDEN CONTRIBUTORS: PART ONE

(1) The twentieth century inventor is most frequently a man with advanced degrees in the employment of a corporation which has the resources to manufacture and promote them. By the beginning of this century the independent inventor was hard pressed to find the means to promote his invention, even if he did succeed in obtaining a patent.

In spite of the problems of no education, no connections and being black, Garrett A. Morgan succeeded in an age in which he was supposed to be obsolete.

Garrett A. Morgan was born in 1877 and was one of eleven children; his brith place was Paris, Kentucky which was a poor mountainous eastern region of that state. There were few opportunities for education of advancement for anyone, much less for a black man. Morgan left school while still in the fifth grade, and at the age of fourteen he left Kentucky and went to Cincinnati Ohio, where he worked for a while as a handyman, after realizing that there was no future for him there, he went on to Cleveland. All he had was his spirit and courage.

He got a job as a sewing machine mechanic, and in the next few years he worked for a number of sewing machine companies. He saved his money and by 1907 he had his own business. Doing this time he had saved enough money so as to allow him to enter marriage with security, he also brought himself a home at this time.

Throughout.history great inventions have been discovered by accident, one of Morgans most profitable enterprises came about in this manner. Morgan lucky accident steemed from a problem he encountered while running a clothing business he had started in 1909. The problem was that the needles on the sewing machine moved so rapidly that the heat of friction caused scorching of some of the fabrics. One day while experimenting with lubricating materials Morgan took time out to go to dinner and in doing so he wiped his hands on a piece of coarse wiry fur cloth that just happen to be close by. Upon his return, he found that the fur had become straight and pliable. To further test it he apillied it to the dogs hair and the results turned out to be the mame. Morgan later incorporated this material into a petroleum jelly base and marketed it as a cosmetic hair straightening preparation. This proved very profitable to him and thereby enable him to spend most of his time on inventing. As a result of his discovery he founded the G.A. Morgan Hair Refining Company, and promoted his product with extensive advertising. The company is still thriving to this day.

(2) Following his success with hair preparation Morgan's inventive activity took a new direction. He had developed an interest in safety devices. What concerned him mostly was the frequent instances of firemen being overcome by thick smoke when they had to enter burning buildings. Morgan's tremendous insight led him to see that the firemen and other workers needed a simple and dependable means for protecting themselves against the effects of smoke and other harmful fumes. At the time their were a variety of crude devices around consisting of tanks of air and tubes. There were all sort of problems accompaining these devices. Many of the respirator devices were so undependable that it was standard procedure to send at least two firemen at a time into a smoky situation, so that one could aid the other in case his respirator broke down.

Morgan started work on what he called a breathing device, in 1910 and by 1912 he felt he had perfected it to the point where he could apply for a patent, this was granted on October 13, 1914, the device was amazing in its simplicity, it consisted of a canvas hood that was placed over the head. From the hood a double tube extended and merged into a single tube at the back of the wearer. The oxygen end was fitted with a sponge that was moistened with water to serve as a trap for smoke particles, and to cool the air which entered the tube. A metal tube inside the hood ran from the mouth of the user to a ball vale at the top of the hood. When exhaled the force of air raised the ball from its seat so that the exhalation could escape. When the user inhaled, the ball was drawn tightly against the seat and the smoke was prevented from entering the hood.

There was nothing that could break down on this ingenious device. Morgan even thought to provide ear channels so the user could hear what was going on around him. Morgan preferred to personally demonstrate his device whenever possible. He thought it advisable for obvious reasons to employ white men to carry out demonstration in the southern cities. He had to disguise himself as a full blooded indian from the Walpole Reservation, Canada; Morgan demonstration consisted of entering a smoke filled tent wearing the safety hood and remaining there for twenty minutes with no apparent ill effects.

Morgan felt that adoption of his invention by a city as large and important as New Orleans was a vital one and he wanted to be there to see that the demonstration went well. Drawing on the experience of earlier black inventors he thought it would be best not to reveal to the New Orleans officials that the safety hood was the product of a black man. What really brought the inventor and his device too the forefront was demonstration put on by faith itself. In 1916 a tunnel was being bult under Lake Erie, for the Cleveland water works. On the night of July 25 of that year there was an explosion in a section of the tunnel. Several rescue parties entered and failed to return. No one else had the courage to enter. It was at this point that Morgan was called to the scene. Decause of the early morning hours he arrived clad only in a pair of pajama bottoms. But he brought several of his safety hoods. Upon arriving at the scene he was met by the major, policemen, and firemen, they all refused to go in the tunnel with him.

Morgan and his brother and two other volunteers donned safety hoods and went down the shaft into the tunnel. They found several dead bodies, but soon they came across the superintendent who was barely breathing; once on the surface the police wanted to use a pulmotor to revive him. Morgan would not allow it (a pulmotor is a device which forcibly drives air into and out of the lungs) he explain that it might rupture the victims lungs. Instead Morgan applied artificial respiration and the victim came around. Morgan went down into the tunnel many more times, when it was seen that he suffered no ill effects others joined him and many of the workers were saved. Morgan was honored as a hero for this all over the country, however when some parts of the country heard about his being black they began to cancel their orders, but this was expected. Andrew Carnegie had endowed the Carnegie hero fund commission to reward people who carried out heroic deeds. Thomas A. Farrell, who was Cleveland director of public works wrote a letter to the commission in 1917 and he described Morgan's rescue efforts. A great deal of correspondence followed, evenually they awarded the hero's metal not to Morgan but to the man whose life he had saved. The commission concluded that what Morgan did was not beyond the call of duty Keeping in mind that Morgan was a private citizen who was under no obligation to risk his life. The whole affair smacked of racism.

Morgan invention did enjoy great success and was adopted by fire departments all over the country; in New York in 1914 Morgan's device won first grand prize, winning out over hundreds of safety devices on exhibit. The events of World War I provided a tragic new use for Morgan's safety hood. The scene was the second battle of Ypres, which was considered important by both sides. The Germans introduced a new weapon they have saved for just this occassion, it was chlorine gas, the British needed a defence for this, they turned to Morgan's safety hood, the model that carried its own supply of air. Morgan device had one draw back, it proved too bulky for the tattlefield but it still manage to save quite a few lives, at least until another more compact model based on Morgan's principals could be developed. After the U.S. entered the war, gas mask based on Morgan's principals were used by both Americans and Germans. "WORLD'S SEXTEST PRISON CREATES FALSE IMAGE" (Article continued from Dec. 91 Weekly Scele)

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) has failed in this price directhe and hus has reshape its philosophy, according to Bill Rentschler. Having served asentence in the "world's sexiest shaper," Rentschler found the facilities designed for the prisoners were hargely for show. In the second of his four part series, he notes that the BOP's e phasis is now on "retribution and detefrence"not rehabilitation.

I spent eight months and 21 days in the Chicago Métropolitan Correctional Center (MCC), a modern federal prison, after pleading guilty to one count of making a false statement to a bank. Above all else, I found most of my fellow immates, about 2/3 black and Lations in their 20s and 30s far removed from the sterotype that convicts are slavering brutes afflicted with some irresistable criminal bent. Most of the men I came to know were good company, sensitive, considerate, thoroughly direct human beings. A majority, I would say, stood above their keepers. Life had dealt many a very bad hand.

Whitney North Seymour, a respected former U.S. attorney, past president of the American Bar Association, and now a New York lawyer-author, contends: There is.... no such classification as the "criminal mind"... Most of those we classify as "criminals" are ordinary people... My observation is that many federal immates tend to be restless, ambitious, creative over-reachers who would make lousy jover ent clerks. While these cualities often are responsible for their incarceration, the very same attributes make them prime prospects for rehabilitation.

It is in its failure to develope this raw talent and make readily available realistic programs of rehabilitation for those who literally crave such help that the Bureau of Prisons properly should be indicted for clear and extreme disfeasance. Recognizing its vulernability, the BOP over the past few years began subtly to reshape its "philosophy" and sell its updated version to Congress, the White House, the federal judiciary, the media, and the public. In the booklet published in August 1976, Bureau Director Norman A. Carlson wrote:... The total emplasis on relabilitation has been modified. We now recognize that retribution and deterence are along with rehabilitation - legith at objectives of incarceration. Relabilitation cannot be coerced. Change, if it comes, must be voluntary on the part of the immate. What Carlson refers to as the modification of "the total emphasis on relabilitation" is a clear admission of failure to relabilitate despite elemnous outlays of funds for this precise purpose over many years. Carlson's statement that relabilitation " "cannot be coerced" infers that is mates generally have resisted and rejected programs of rehabilitation that were offered them.

"That is nothing more than a cop-out," snorts Seattle prison reformer Ira Schwartz. "All that statement does is legitimize the warehousing of human beings." I spoke at lenght during my imprisonment with countless inmates hungering for help, desperate for a clance at rehabilitation, literally terified by the prospect of release without the tools to make it in the outside world. Such help simply is not forthcoming. A prisoners who had served a combined total of 57 years at 11 different federal prisons. Their responses to cueries about relabilitation were u iformly terse and titter: "No such a imal," said one; the others were explatic in agreement.

Truly successful rehabilitation, after all, runs counter to the bureaucractic instinct to expand. Too much rehabilitation would mean less - not more - inmates, prisons, jobs, budget dollars. That is no way to run a "growth" industry. Success in rehabilitation would lead eventually to direct conflict with the "invested interests" what Japes McGoha, a former inmate now fighting for a poratorium on prison construction, has branded "the prison-industrial complex."

Its obvious failure to relabilitate explains the BOP's efforts to put new stress on "retribution" and "deterrence."

"Retribution" st ply seams venteance or retaliation, and there is little evidence it has any positive impact on reducing only, we Americans often see ourselves as a war learted, open-lander, altruistic people. But there is a darker side too, which is part of the Alerican character, a marrow strain of Puritan righteousness. For along the trail of 700 years, we America's lurned "witches," ravaged Indians, oppressed blacks, persecuted Jews and other minorities, and incarcerated Japanese-Americans. It is this larsh streak which asserts itself in matters of crite and punishment.

The third element of the Bureau's revised guidelines is "deterrence," whose effectiveness is e-ually difficult to pin down, but which at least has the merit of some logic. Some penologists, for example, believe prison sentences might deter illegal acts by officials of large public corporations, price fixers, brikers, and their ilk, who generally are effectively insulated by unlimited lawyers, lobbyists, and lucre from serious treat of incarceration. Even here, it would ake sense to measure the prison term in weeks or conths - as in some European countries - and simultaneously to bit the offender hard in his wallet, requiring restitution and fines geared to his income a door net worth in lieu of prison time. If the profit is removed from the rip-off, the deterrent effect is likely to be substantial.

Conversely, Clief Appellate Court Jud e David L. Bazelon of the District of Columbia doubts that the street original - unlike the white collar offender - "veights the risks of punish ent...vith no job, no opportunity, no close faily ties, he may well believe he has more to gain than he has to lose." Sentences that extend beyond one year - except where violence or mental illness are involved - mulckly become self-defeating, especially with young offenders. Bitterness and despars en ulf the inmate, erodial his spirit, submer in his identity, forcing him into shothful patits, exposing him at length to chronic lawbreakers, making it far less likely he will adjust to freedom when it coles.

Ira Schwartz charges the BOP has haved seriously behind in the projection of composible and effective community-based programs and in insuring use of incarberation as a last resort and certainly only for those offenders who absolutely peed is. Far more federal prisoners than at present can and should be paroled after serving the required minimum one-hard of their sentences, or placed by the OP in work release programs and or halfway houses to start living again and supporting their failies before their for al release. The U.S. Parole Commission, now an 'independent" agency, paroles reluctantly, when at all, and is mired in sentencing uidelines often utterly irrelevant to the facts of a particular case. Federal udges take only sparing use of their probation option, which has shown uniformly ood results at a fraction of the \$10,000 to \$00,000 annual cost per in ate of inarceration.

The aura throughout the syste - from an inmate viewpoint - is sufficient, ervaded by flyspeck regulations, calculated to wear down, discourage, demean, and bill ately destroy even the most stoic and circumspect. So a staff a bers genuinely and to help, and they make life bearable. In Chicago, one such is Education Coordnator Katherine Hogan, a 50-ish refugee from the East St. Louis ghetto with the ook of a wellupholstered Leta Horne. Hogan fought like a protective tigress for y boys," your, and black, middleaged and white, winning small but hepossible attles by sheer intensity of effort.

NOTICE TO PRISONERS WHO HAVE BEEN DENIED PAROLE

Two of the inmates of this prison have brought a class action in federal court on behalf of all inmates of this prison who have been denied parole during their current term of imprisonment. The only issue in this action is whether the prisooners who are members of the plaintiff class are entitled to examine their parole files prior to their parole release hearings. The parole file of each prisoner contains, among other things, his presentence report, psychiatric reports, any prior misconduct reports, and other documents relating to the prisoner which state officials have either themselves written or acquired from private persons during the course of the prisoner's involvement in legal process.

If you have been denied parole during your current term of imprisonment, you will automatically be made a member of the plaintiff class in this action, and therefore will benefit from any favorable judgment or be bound by an unfavorable judgment, unless you take steps set forth below to exclude yourself from the class of plaintiffs. Any prisoner who does so exclude himself will be entitled as a matter of law to raise the issue of access to his parole file by his own suit against the Board of Parole, although, as a practical matter, the judgment in the slass action will probably dictate the outcome of similar suits. If you wish to exclude yourself from the class action described above, you must give notice of your decision by a letter addressed to the attorney for the plaintiff class:

HISTORIA DE PUERTO RICO

En 1508 llego a la isla de la Mona la primera expedicion colonizadora de Ponce de Leon (compuesta de un navio carabelon) con 50 hombres. De alli recorren la costa sur de Puerto Rico. HISTORY OF PUERTO RICO

Ponce de Leon's first colonizing expedition arrived at Isla de la Mona in 1508. It compromised one ship, (Carabelon), bearing 50 men. From there they went to the southern coast of Puerto Rico, they landed near a large indian village, the chief of whom was named Agueybana, gave them a friendly welcome. The Spaniards established with the indians a treaty of friendship. Shortly after, Ponce de Leon sailed up the northern coast, discovers the bay of 1 San Juan and continued on until they came to the mouth of the river, (Manati) they landed and explored as far as the Toa River. In the meantime, the ship went to HIspaniola, (Santo Domingo), to take on victuals, and then sailed back to pick up Ponce de Leon and his men, From there, they returned to the Bay of San Juan, and after searching for a safe place, they finally found it and there Ponce de Leon built the first settlement which he named Caparra.

The first phase of the conquest was peaceful. 


