## "IMMATE CHIDES OFFICIALS FOR MAKING SYSTEM FOIL"

Tre Federal Bureau of Prisons is a sladow ar of our federal rureaucracy that exercises a solute control over the lodias, welfare, and destinies of ore tian 30,000 Anericans oit tis very dey. It extracts tle sueat of iss ciar es, for wlach ic pays slave wa es as low as five to seven cens an lour, avera a out to cencs an !our, avera in' aiout to cents an lour, wile any dependents scrape to et ly o.. wellare and fa ilies disinte rate.

Te adverso fluence o perlaps ano her uarter-million people intimately related or all eत o hof.rs rup - spouses, clidren a d randck ldrel, paren e, s:l 113 and ot: or rola ves lovers, fre ds aind assor ases - s mearl as pervas vo as on clos iol C : ars.

Worst of all, perlaps, is tle impact on joun - ad innocent - fanilies. Wifredo whose Latino cron es called Lin Mickey, was string, sallow, and kent, with eyes red. from cryin. He pasted a rim canvas of fi a cial desperation, whicl, repeated edlessly, adds up to thousands of slattered familles and ill ons of dollers in taxes to underwrite the cost of confine ent for the creadinners and welfare for those "imprisored" on tie outside.
"I co: een lere," Micka told : e in fractured En I:sl late one vi rit, "...y wife I leave weetl tweny-tlree dollar. I ot tow leetle keed, nice coys. Wot they do now? They cry, tiot's wot. M. wife, sle cry, too. I cry. Who care? I hurt nobody. I sell a leetle dope, tla'sall. Not alla tire. Two, ti ree tire aybe. Make ae a few ucks to et sloes and feed'e. Iny I een lere? Wlat do it do any ood?"

Fro: its inception in 1930, the a:nual tud et for the Bureau rose over its first four decades to $\$ 79.4$ wilio in 1970, then spurced ore tran four-iold in leas than one-cuarter of that time to aiout $\$ 34+$ rillion in fiscal 1977, whis anded Sepiemer 30. Additio al costs in aid co depe dents and lost real earnin s are incalculàle. A:d, elmost cribinally, the Bureau is sut one appenda e of the U.S. Depart ent of
 ratus tiat has failed alysmally in its ain mission.

For the relentless ađva ce of serious crine int e Uniced States is our ost
larin: rational iailure. Tis uninuely resourceful nation - connueror of the moon, exiender of the life span, creacor of un atcled affluence - see s stran elj inept in ts laphazard efforts to ste the crime explosion in A erica. The record is appallin: Tle rate of serious crine is far reaiar iere - and rowinl faster - than in any civized nation of the world. At tle sale time, tiose conveted of crines i. tie United States, a fin sliver of t?ose wo comat crines are far ore likely to e sentenced to priso and to serve lon er se tences - of ien tl ree to five tiles lon er - than anywiere else. At the federal level, wore than 50 percent ol all persois convicted of crifes are sent to prison, tiis even thou $h$ their crices are ee erally less serious and far less viole:t tian tiose tried a most state courts wiere a uck s:aller perca a e serve pr son erms.

Cercainly priso s et "cri inals" off tie sureet ? ut there seens little evidence that they are conv uti to a lower crite rate. The fact is, our approac: to crire is steeped in isinfor ailo, ytr, and ouri it pre, ud ce. Our law enforcement estatislent and politicians contritute most to this co:dition. The former las a vital stake in a nifyi its own exploits a diterally terrifyin the average citizen. Politicos from Main Street to Statalouse and Con ress slamelessly exploit constituent fears with a steady diet of "toul cop" speecles and ilpossille crilestoppin. proises. Most of their panaceas involve throwin; more cad ujs into priso. for lon er terms.

Doston's police clief, Rovert DiGrazia, clides lis law enforcenent bretiren: "Rather tran speakin: up, rost of us stand silet and let politicians et away with law-and-order rletoric that reinforces the mistake. notion that (we) can control crice...As lon; as we are sile t, society will expect the inpossible...."

IN evertleless, the Pederal law enforcenent a encies rave take public co:cer as a mandate. Federal prosecutors becane superstars in tie Mixon-Mitclell era of "et tou ?" law enforcement. As a result, our federal prison population alo e as slot upward by an incredi!le -3 percent in the last two years alone. Tris number includes "political" and otler special cate ory prisoners wicl the DOP is loatl to acknowled e ruc less discuss.

The tillipped Water ate ur lar G. Gordo: Lidd, recently released after serv1... $5 \cdot \frac{1}{2}$ montis in federal orison for a bun led joc. Normally, a rreakin-and-enteril. rap under less cla fotorious circurstances draws a priso sentence, if $a y$, ueasured in weeks rat! er tha jears. Lest all tis ie dis ssed as ere sour surmise, Iormer U.S. Attor eys l:ke Wit ey North Seymur of New York and Thomas A uinas Foran of Clica o lave spoke out:
"Notody alive's a sai.t," sajs Fora, "and if a federal prosecutor decides to etyou, you'ra a ofer, o fuestion. Iell, U.S. Attorney is the ost powerful position in A erica, tar o.e. If le i ores his oatl, watc out!" Varns Seyiour: A prosecuti.., attor e uader our syster las trene dous power, and with th at power there is the potential por a use. Particularly w en prosecutor s politicall: amitious and tlinks of lis office as the road to over orsl p or otler ii ! elected positio.... Aluse of the office e ins to creep in wh a prosecutor makes decisions cased on i s ow personal scake in the pullicity at in fesult.

Ter an Sclwartz and Iruce Jackson, professors of law at the State Universicy of New York at Duffalo, writia in 197 in Iarper's, also put plainly the treac: I. theory, the prosecutor is a Neutral ejent, a d si ce prosecutors cla... to act in the thterest of putlic orality aid safety, there are few restrai ts on those wio decide to akuse their extraordinar, powers. Sucl áse, wlic! occurs in otl political and crimi al cases, as increased si ificartly ir tie past decade. Worse yet, any prosecutors eirae in ille al acts not lecause they are co cerned with the ustress of the case, lut secause tiey woin to win. Even if tie are found out, the police and the courcs seldo do anytin a out it...

Tlis of course, is not to sua est the political or proninent aiscreants should not de prosecuted. It is a focus on clear and present dan er to leman ricits and perso al lilerty when a prosecutor sees limself as an "aven in an el" or potential political superstar and uses is office to "et" wlatever means those ie "knows" are uilty or those le presuies can advance ins career.

The media fre-uently de fies the zeolous prosecutor, and alandons its touted adversary oll atto in cuestlonir: lis ore extreme or repressive tactics. Bven jud es react to tlis "puilic co cern" and tle press too often sakes ?eroes out of judes wlo are tou and scern, i arin, even critic zin tiose wo are wise and Iair. I dictrents and convictions are :eadlined, acruittals kuried.

Public perception, understandably shaped by and rooted in such statements and stories, often is emotional, simplistic and quite savage. Peopleolash out at "lenient" sentences by "soft" judges, who in turn impose harsher sentences. The cycle is endless and leads nowhere. We get no closer to damping the crime explosion in America.

The gauge of a prison system's success - once it has performed its more or less routine custodial obligation to protect society from dangerous criminals - ought to be its contribution to reducing crime. Its prime function - and singular objective - must be to return inmates to the streets fit and hopefully motivated to become law-abiding $c$ itizens. By that standard, the contribution of the Federal Bureau of Prisons is largely, dismally negative. 921200

Instead, its charges are spewed into society's frightening maelstrom, demeaned, embittered, dulled by idleness, too often unskilled, untrained to cope, unequipped to do anything as rewarding as their past criminal endeavors. They become instant victims of society's ugly prejudice against convicts. Their families are frequently fragmented, their friends melted away, their contacts nil. They have no prospects, little hone. Inevitably, all too many of these forlorn creatures return to crime as their only means of survival - and thus again to prison. The performance of the Federal Bureau of Prisons is esnecially shameful. It is, after all, unicuely positioned to innovate and shed the old, oppressive, dehumanizing ways of locking offenses against society.

But the guiding philosophy of the BOP, expressed to me bluntly in an off-guard moment by W.R. (Ray) Nelson, is "cover your ass." Nelson, former warden of the Chicago MCC and now warden at the Danbury, Conn. federal prison, was expressing not 2 formula for lessening crime but the common bureaucratic maxim for survival and advancement. So, even though shrinkage would be the surest yardstick of progress, the $B O P$ continues to grow like a hardy, promiscuous weed, scattered across the land, often unseen in remote back country. It is described by one reformer as "all but invisible." The BOP operates largely without oversight under its own set of mystifying, constantly-shifting rules. 0 : I anc
