When we leave here, we can say our stay was not very pleasant, some amount of time will be left behind, but we can pick up our past, consider it an experience to remember.

BLACK VOICE

Andrew Young, the U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, and the highest ranking black man in government, was again called on the carpet by the administration for chastisement.

In Geneva, Young was quoted as saying: "There are hundreds, perhaps even thousands of people in the United States whom I could consider as political prisoners." In Washington, government officials "freaked-out". The remark by Young brought about impeachment demands from Congress, and a demand from Sen. Barry Goldwater (remember him?) that Young consider resigning. The House rejected, 293-82, an impeachment resolution. However, President Carter and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance got together to prescribe a reprimand to Young.

Ambassador Young's remarks were badly timed and an embarrassment to the administration in the wake of the trials of Anatoly Shcharansky (a Jewish activist), and Alexander Ginzburg (a member of a group that monitors Soviet human rights). The U.S. government has issued denunciation of the Russians for the treatment of dissidents. Regardless there is truth in Young's statement; as has been the case in the past. Depending on who has been doing the defining of "political prisoner", minorities do go to prison more often. A study in Hennipen County, for example, found that Indians and Blacks were twice as likely as white to be sentenced to jail for felony convictions. Young included people who end up in jail because of bias in our political system within his definition of "political prisoners".

Let us hope that Ambassador Young continues on his job as the United Nations Ambassador and a Black man.

Young has been a good Ambassador; he has gained the respect and understanding of the third world countries. This is a time when the U.S. finally must recognize the importance of the Third World countries to us. Perhaps America will take a look at its own dissidents/political prisoners.

THE JAIL WHERE INMATES CAN EARN MORE
 THAN THE CORRECTIONS OFFICER

It pays to serve time at the maximum security prison in Maine State whose inmates can earn more money than guards.

At least five cons earn \$15,000 a year producing handicrafts, angering guards whose top pay after six years of service is only \$10,296.

Sixteen year state prison guard Robert Walsh and union head complains that it isn't fair. "Authorities should put a damper on this."

The inmates who are maintained at state expense to begin with buy their own materials, but pay nothing for the use of jail shops and equipment to make novelty items approved by an inmate committee.

The prisoners set their own prices and receive all proceeds from the sale in a store on a busy tourist highway outside the jail. Warden Richard Oliver reportedly said that four or five prisoners have earned the maximum \$15,000 a year allowed in the program, in which 179 of the 454 inmates participate.

However, guards charge, even more inmates are topping the \$15,000 figure by placing their products in the names of other prisoners who fork over the revenue for a small fee.

A guard told of a prisoner whose family received food stamps. Yet after turning out handicrafts, the guard said the con plunked down over \$20,000 for a choice piece of property near the jail.

Warden Oliver insisted the program was worthwhile. "The inmates learn some business principles and the free enterprise system", he said.

"That's not what they're put in here for," snapped union chief Walsh, who will raise the issue of inmates earnings in negotiations for a new contract for the one-hundred and twenty guards.

LAW PAGE

In one of this month's legal periodicals, I read an very interesting cited case which has been a constant source of legal discussions among those of the general population, who have been or will be affected by its interpretation, to wit:

"Apparently relying on the State Constitution's due process clause, the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals held that a prisoner whose alleged misconduct may subject him to an increase in either his sentence or the severity of his confinement environment must be afforded an evidentiary hearing. The Court rejects the reasoning of the United States Supreme Court in Meachum v. Fano, 427 U.S. 215, 1976, which held that a state prisoner has no federal due process right to a hearing prior to a transfer to another state institution."

The Court stated that "Meachum was based upon an erroneous "black and white" characterization of the liberty status of convicted criminals, and that the State and Federal Constitutions protect rather than confer liberty, and even after a defendant has been convicted, the State must overcome "the great presumption" that he is a free man before imposing new restrictions."

"The Court finds support for its views in Wolff v. McDonnell, 418 U.S. 539, in which the Supreme Court held that a state could not deprive a prisoner of good time

credit for alleged misconduct without affording him a due process hearing. Moreover, intraprison transfers to administrative segregation have already been held to implicate due process. Tasker v. Griffith, 338 SE2d 229, 1977." The due process protections applicable in this situation are the familiar ones set down in Gagon v. Scarpelli, 411 U.S. 778, 1973, and Morrissey v. Brewer, 408 U.S. 471 1972, with the addition of the rights to counsel."

The Court stated further emphatically that "We cannot agree with the black and white characterixation of the liberty status of convicted criminals that the Court adopted, anking them, as Justice Stevens mentioned in his perceptive dissent, "slaves of the state." "Our Federal and State Constitution do not give liberty to people: they protect a free people from deprivation of their God-given freedom by governments." "The entitlement to liberty and freedom must follow every citizen from birth to death, however mean or degenerate he may be viewed by his government or his peers at any given time along the way."

With the above in mind and proper perspective, the "physical deprivation of his liberty must at every stage carry the burden upon the State to overcome the great presumption that he is a free man." "His constitutional rights follow him into prison or mental hospital, or military service or wherever he is forced by the government to be."

Therefore, although it is true that restrictions upon liberty are implicit in the penal system, each must be imposed reluctantly, and new ones, with due process of law.

THE STATE POLICE NEED A CIVILIAN, NOT A "PROFESSIONAL" POLICEMAN
Connecticut's new Department of Public Safety, which will absorb the State Police Department, next year, should be headed, Lt. Gov. Robert Killian says, "not by a bureaucratic administrator, not by an accountant, not an auditor, but a professional policeman."

That's the easy thing to say when one is facing a crowd of police officers, as the lieutenant Governor was doing Wednesday, but anyone facing up to the recent history of the Connecticut State Police would have a hard time coming to the same conclusion.

For the scandals which have shamed the state police over the last ten years have occurred during the tenure of commissioners who were professional police officers, and to a large extent occurred during the period because the department was led by a professional policeman.

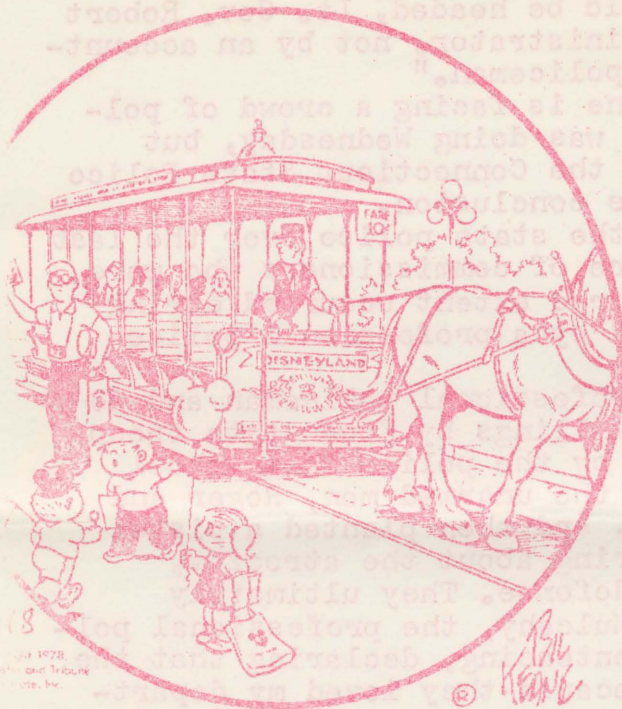
Commissioner Leo J. Mulcahy was a professional policeman and he concealed and then made excuses for the killings by four state troopers of two unarmed burglars in an ambush by the police in a school in Norwich in May 1969. The trooper shot the unarmed men, Roger and Gene Perkins, in the back with a shotgun, and then planted a pistol at the scene and lied at a coroner's hearing about the atrocity, maintaining that they had acted in self-defense. They ultimately were convicted of prejury. Commissioner Mulcahy, the professional policeman, appealed for leniency at their sentencing, declaring that the troopers had killed and lied about it "because they loved my department, and they thought that the criticism would be so much that it would hurt this great department that I am so proud of, that these men are so proud of."

Commissioner Mulcahy also allowed another policeman to run amok in various criminal cases, most notably the prosecution of Roy Darwin in the murder of Hope Fern Rockwell in Veron in 1963. State troopers and Major Rome used appalling tactics against Mr. Darwin, holding him incommunicado for three days, evading his lawyer's habeas corpus order from the court, attempting to hypnotize him into confessing and seizing evidence available, their tactics caused them to lose the case twice, once on appeal to the Conn Supreme Court and the United States Supreme Court. By the time of the third trial, there wasn't any legal evidence left, and Mr. Darwin went free when the state no longer could prosecute. Commissioner Mulcahy did nothing to reprimand the major for his many excesses, which led to many failures beyond Darwin.

In the investigation of the November 1969 murder of Paget Weatherley, a student at UCONN Major Rome publicly accused a young man arrested on drug charges near the campus of killing the young woman. But no murder charge ever brought against the drug case defendant, and six years later another man involved in other violent crimes confessed to and was convicted of killing Miss Weatherley. Again Commissioner Mulcahy failed to find anything wrong with Major Rome's reckless bluster.

The tenure of Commissioner Edward Leonard, who is retiring next week, saw scandals which are better remembered because they are continuing. There is the Peter Reilly case, of course, where tactics similar to those in the Darwin case were used. There is the commissioner's blocking of the investigation of police corruption in Stamford. There is the prosecution of Andrew John Carr for the murder of Dawn Peterson in North Windham in March 1976, where again police used grossly illegal tactics to obtain evidence for a weak case, and where there was no conviction. And there was the letter from the commissioner praising the officers who were involved with the cold-blooded murder of the unarmed burglars. The real question is, when will there be a change?
