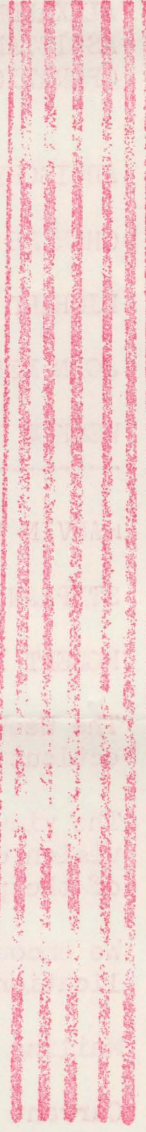
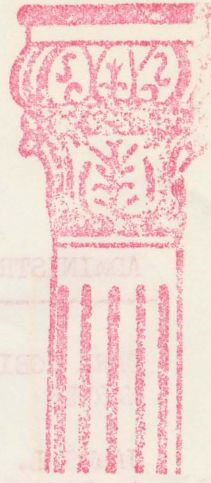

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"PREPARING FOR THE CULTURE SHOCK"

You've been existing in a new world, a city within a city, a new culture. When your time is up, ask yourself...Are you prepared for society? You'll be reacting to a new environment. Orientation of a new culture. Many of you probably felt this only occurs with the change of a country, town, community, or even a change in jobs. But, the transition to society from a penal institution can cause such reactions. What is it? The CULTURE SHOCK!!!!

Society can be likened to a game of "Monopoly". If you break the rules, your punished, but if you stay within the boundaries, you prosper.

Americans are so caught up in their competitive minds, that no matter how minute, they want to win, it's a "game". Each person within the framework of being involved in a particular game, rationalizes. It's a way of stressing or seeing the extent of which people perform. Whether this be stealing, lying, or even cheating.

We've all fallen into a state called "latent" (hidden), because of our lack of awareness to what's really happening in our society.

Whether we fall under the category of social order or disorder, we need some control, but not some institutional control such as this, where the human personality (as we know it) would no longer exist, we'd be tranquilized and robotized, with personalities programmed such as computers.

Let's prepare our own program. With the ability, man in process, is something. There will always be self-discovery, self-development. We are elusive and incomplete beings. So as to prepare ourselves, now is the time for probing, experimenting. Keep the notion, attach proper values or detach old unnecessary ones. Taking our alternatives and expanding or condensing them. Right now, none of us are sure of our place in society, so we are skeptical and shouldn't fear our skepticism.

I mentioned in the past, filling a void, well, awareness that we have to give our life some meaning, emphasizes our will to explore our personality and it's potential. Experiences (such as being here), produce heightened consciousness. Once we become aware of our multiple selves, only then can we self-expand and promote some true goals.

Society can be likened to a game, but that doesn't mean life must be played at. Because if we do, it will only obscure the traditional boundaries between fantasy and reality. People in society, presently, perform millions of social acts in the course of a day. The outcome is only a reasonable approximation of order. Without any control you realize the total confusion, chaos, and complete bedlam. We would just cease to survive. No system is perfect from the point of view from all it's members, not all goals will be met, attained or fulfilled. A lot of confusion is caused, due to some important realms (gov't., judicial system), in which the majority violates the socially or legally defined standard, and often at great cost. The root of most of the misery is greed, and the majority of businesses and in the world systemize greed. Which in turn affects the normal man.

We could refer to the "Utopian" possibility (any idealized place of perfection). As a whole, many of us consider the world (society) as being plastic. Here, we are not allowed to be self, it's not customary. We're tense, suppressed! Otherwise we could find some relaxation. Not the lounging type, but some satisfaction, in other words, our aim would be to encourage self-expression to the point where the traditional boundaries between fantasy and reality would not be so blurred, thus allowing individuals to assume certain personalities without fear of penalty.

MOVING ON
PREPARING FOR THE CULTURE SHOCK (Continued)

The need in preparation would include mobility, effort, the will to survive, but prosperously. Mobility can be the landmark (foundation). Because it's a progress through various kinds of work, not necessarily linear upward movement in a particular society, but it's definitely going up the ladder rather than down.

Just like outside, in here we have our society, and there's a sense of consensus (agreement). We have a co-ordinated, mutual decision by all members of a group to accept and act on the rules as if they agreed unanimously. An individual may differ, but he sets aside his differences either for the good of the group or to continue belonging to that group.

Skepticism, predictability, we need both of them. For some type of security, predictability is necessary. It's the reasons behind the rules, and without the rules nobody would know what behavior to expect from anybody else. Rules tell us what behavior to expect from ourselves.

The court systems are unfair its true, we need something. Imagine giving an individual freedom to be judge of his own actions. The punishment for disobeying that "voice" would only be guilt. Your family may "lose face" and still the only punishment would be "shame". If we had that, none of us would even exist! We have values some more important than others but they are built into us or implanted as conscience.

Achieving status, that we'd like to. Thus, staying away from societies such as this (prison). Humans separate themselves from animals by their behavior or how their treated, here, you see very little seperation, causing you to wonder.

For such a long time, the saying has been that, the meaning of life is not any "afterlife", it doesn't lay there, but in work itself. The struggle upward. As we end our walks through these halls, lets be prepared for the Culture Shock. Sure it's work, and it's a struggle, but...it's UPWARD !

The annual Retreat will be held in the Catholic Chapel Area the 15th, 16th, and 17th of September. The Retreat will be conducted by Father Pierre Wolfe, from France, Sister Mary Mergan, and the Maryhouse Sisters.

Retreat is a time of meditation, prayer, sharing, opening of hearts and minds, and the lifting of voices in song. It is a change from everyday prison life, and a time of open receptivity among each other.

Retreat will begin Friday the 15th, at 6:00 P.M. and continue until recall that evening. It will start again Saturday morning at 8:30 A.M. and run until 11:00 that morning. The afternoon session will begin at 1 P.M. and run until recall. In the evening it will start at 6 P.M. and go on until 8:30 P.M. It will start after Mass on Sunday Morning. It will end at 3:00 on Sunday afternoon.

Last year we had a beautiful prayer session, but unfortunately there were a few guys that used this retreat for a hangout for the second movie. This will not happen this year. If you come to the Retreat you will be there until that particular part of it is over. This is something that a lot of the population who attends takes seriously and the Sisters dedicate a lot of time to doing this for us. I only hope that this year we can have a little respect for those that are trying to get something out of the Retreat.

Retreat consists of prayer sessions, group discussions, talks by the Sisters and Father Pierre, sharing of thoughts, reading of different scriptures, and singing.

I have attended only two retreats here, but I have gained a lot of peace of mind from the short period of time it is held in. It is something that is very beautiful if you can sit and open your mind to God. It is sometimes hard to do that in a place like this, because there are always officers and other people looking over your shoulder and watching you. At the Retreat the only one who could possibly bother you, or be looking over your shoulder is God. There are no officers to bother you, you can sit and meditate and pray as you wish. You can talk to other people, the Sisters and other inmates, about your feelings towards God and no one will laugh or ridicule you for it.

I think that anyone who sometimes thinks about God, should come and at least try to communicate with our Lord at this very special time.

STANDARDS FOR GRANTING PAROLE

The Connecticut General Statutes provide the Board with the authority to release an inmate on parole if it appears that "there is a reasonable probability that such an inmate will live and remain at liberty without violating the law and such release is not incompatible with the welfare of society." The Statutes do not provide that upon reaching date of eligibility the prisoner is granted parole at that time. The panels, therefore, use their discretion as to if and when in the interest of the prisoner himself and of society an inmate should be paroled.

Parole is not granted merely as a reward for good conduct or efficient performance. There are many factors involved in the decision of the Board as to the "reasonable probability" that an inmate will not violate the law and that his release is compatible with the welfare of society. Most inmates, but not all, are afforded at least one parole prior to the expiration of their sentences.

Among the factors considered by the Boards' panels in the parole decision process are:

1. The nature and circumstance of an inmates offense and his current attitude towards it.
2. The inmate's prior criminal record and his parole adjustment if he has been paroled previously.
3. The inmate's attitude toward family members, the victim, and authority in general.
4. The inmate's institutional adjustment, including his participation and progress in the areas of the institutional program important to his self-improvement.
5. The inmate's employment history, his occupational skills, and his employment stability.
6. The inmate's physical, mental, and emotional problems.
7. The inmate's insight into the causes of his past criminal conduct.
8. The inmate's effort to find solutions to his personal problems such as addiction to narcotics, excessive use of alcohol, the need of academic and vocational education, etc., and his use of the available resources related to such problems in the institutional program.
9. The adequacy of the inmate's parole plans. The latter includes the environment to which the inmate plans to return, the character of those with whom he plans to be associated, and the adequacy of his residence and employment program.

THE PANELS DECISIONS

Following the panels discussion with the inmate, he is temporarily excused and after careful deliberation and evaluation of all the information obtained from the inmate and the records pertaining to him a decision is made by majority vote of the panel. The panel may decide to parole, deny parole, or continue the inmate's case for further investigation. If parole is granted, the panel will also set a date of release which may be the parole eligibility date or, in appropriate cases, some later date. The inmate is then recalled and informed of the decision. If the decision is to deny parole, or to continue the case pending further investigation, the inmate is informed of the reasons why and the date for when he will next be eligible for a parole hearing. Whenever possible, the panel will also suggest to the inmate and/or the institutional treatment staff any action it believes may accelerate the inmates rehabilitation and possibly parole. The rehearing date is established for each inmate individually as a result of the panel's judgment of the factors involved in his case.

Since the Board votes parole thirty to eighty days prior to parole eligibility it requires all who have been voted parole to continue in those programs in which they are involved (unless they are transferred to a different institution) and continue to earn satisfactory work, conduct, and institutional adjustment record. Failure to do this may result in a revision of the release date or the rescinding of the previous parole action. The panel may parole inmates to programs in Connecticut, to other states under terms of the Interstate Parole Compact, or to warrants. In addition, medical paroles may be granted to inmates who have completed their minimum terms, if any, upon the recommendations of the medical staff, to facilitate medical treatment at non-correctional institutional hospitals. Unless otherwise specified all paroles granted medical paroles for this purpose are to be returned immediately to the correctional institution upon being discharged from the hospital.
