wanted anything to do with formerly Jose Baret. But Marlon Starling, our glitshic hero who needed a big victory to come lost stature in the welterweight, not only took the fight with the hard-g Baret but won it in convincing style.

As Starling simply put it after the fight, "It was like an amateur in with a veteran."

Starling's fourth round KO of Baret at the Sands Hotel less than two weeks ago vaulted the "Magic Man" back into the welterweight championship picture which now has two champs replacing the retired Sugar Ray Leonard: Milton McCrory (WBC) and Donald Curry (WBA).

Baret, who came into the fight with 16 straight victories and 15 knockouts, had never been in with anyone like a Starling. And it showed from the opening bell as Starling rushed to Baret's

corner as Baret knelt down to give the sign of the cross. It was not to be Baret's last mistake.

Baret scored with the first punch of the afternoon, a good right to the body, and proceeded to chase Starling in hopes of landing a big punch. Starling was elusive, though a Baret left and an accompanying slip sent "Moochie" to the canvas. Referee Arthur Mercante called it a knock-down, but Starling and everyone else in attendance at the plush Copa Room felt it was a mere slip.

Starling came out in the second round aggressively and scored well as puffiness under Baret's right eye was visible. Then in round three, Starling backed Baret into a corner and began pummeling the Dominican with uppercuts. The finish came near the end of the fourth when Starling unleashed a double left which scorched Baret, sending him into the Twilight Zone.

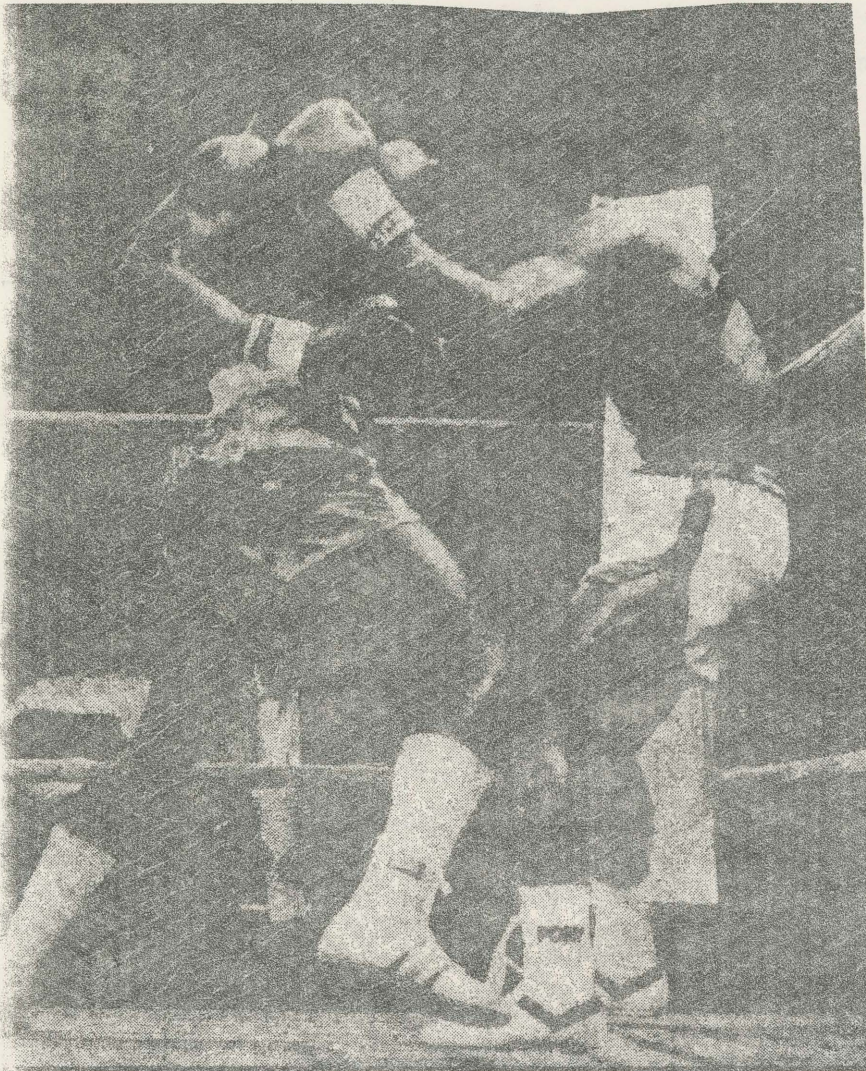
"It had all the ingredients of a great fight," Madison Square Garden's John Condon said following the fight. "Marlon just took over and he was the best right from the start. He completely intimidated Baret."

Condon was so impressed with Starling that he said, "I think he could beat (Alexis) Arguello Arguello's just right for him."

On a potential Aaron Pryor-Starling matchup Condon said, "It would be a slugger match. Marlon is a smarter fighter than Pryor. It would be a war."

Condon added that Madison Square Garden is interested in promoting an April fight in Hartford which would be televised on CBS. "It's 99-1 it (Starling's next fight) will be in Hartford," Condon said.

Harold Weston, Madison Square Garden's boxing matchmaker, was equally impressed with Starling's early dispatch of Baret. "I always thought he was the best in the world," said a definitive Weston. "I never thought it would go the distance."

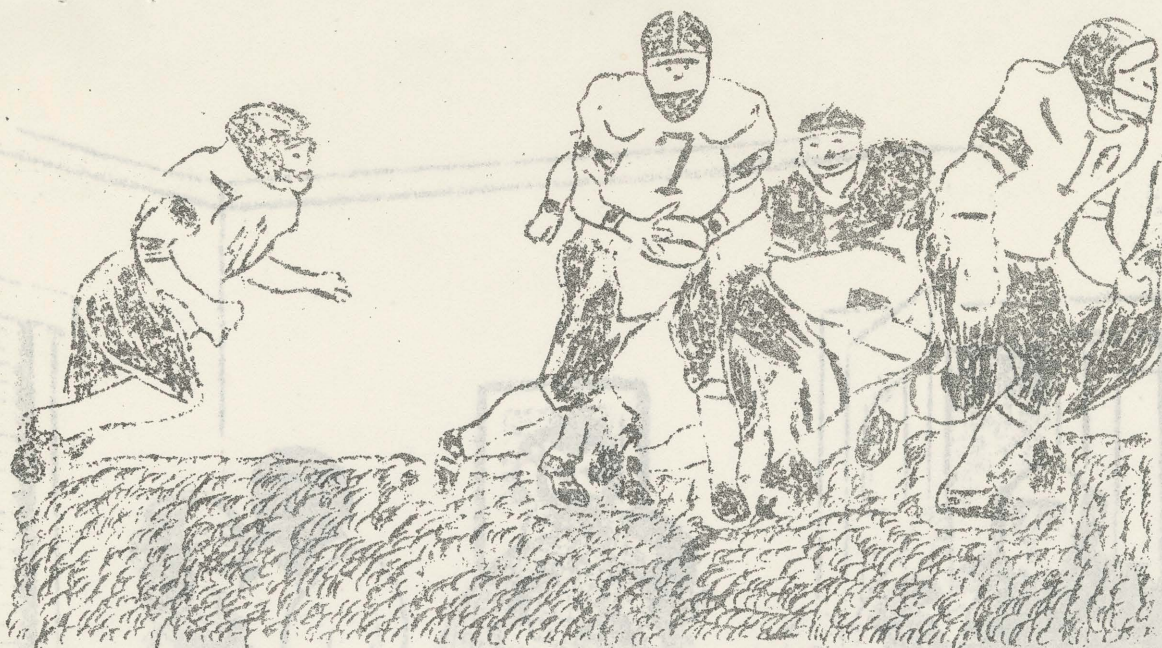
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NETWORKS FINALIZING U.S.F.L. COVERAGE

Springtime football is only weeks away, and the two television networks which will play a major role in determining the success of the new United States Football League are putting the final touches on their broadcast plans.

ESPN, the Bristol-based national cable network, recently announced the two announcing teams it will employ for its weekly Monday and Saturday evening slates.

On Monday nights, veteran announcer Jim Simpson will call the play-by-play and former Buffalo Bills lineman Paul Maguire will handle analysis. The Saturday night team will be Tom Kelly and Don Heinrich. Kelly is a west coast based announcer who has called University of Southern California basketball and football games for two decades and is the voice of the San Diego Chargers of the NFL. Heinrich, a New York Giants quarterback in the 1950's, has done color commentary for the Seattle Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers the past seven years.

In Simpson and Maguire, ESPN has two announcers who are veterans of NBC coverage of professional football. Simpson was a long time voice of AFL games on the network, and Maguire handled color work on regional AFC games for eight years prior to joining ESPN in 1979. Simpson has handled ESPN's major college football games since the network's inception, and Maguire has worked some Canadian Football League games as well as U.S. college games.

The Simpson-Maguire duo will handle the inaugural ESPN-USFL broadcast on March 7, when the Michigan Panthers meet the Birmingham Stallions.

That's one day after ABC will debut its new broadcast team and weekly Sunday afternoon coverage of the USFL.

Network veteran Keith Jackson will call the play-by-play, along with former Pittsburgh Steelers receiver Lynn Swann, who will be making his first regular start in the broadcast booth. They'll be joined on the field by Tim Brant, sports director of the ABC affiliate in Washington. Brant will be responsible for sideline interviews, an innovation restricted to college football thus far which ABC will now extend to the pros.

No word yet on local radio coverage of the USFL.

England asked Dr. Drew to help them do this. The American Red Cross needed him also. Dr. Drew became a director of the American Red Cross.

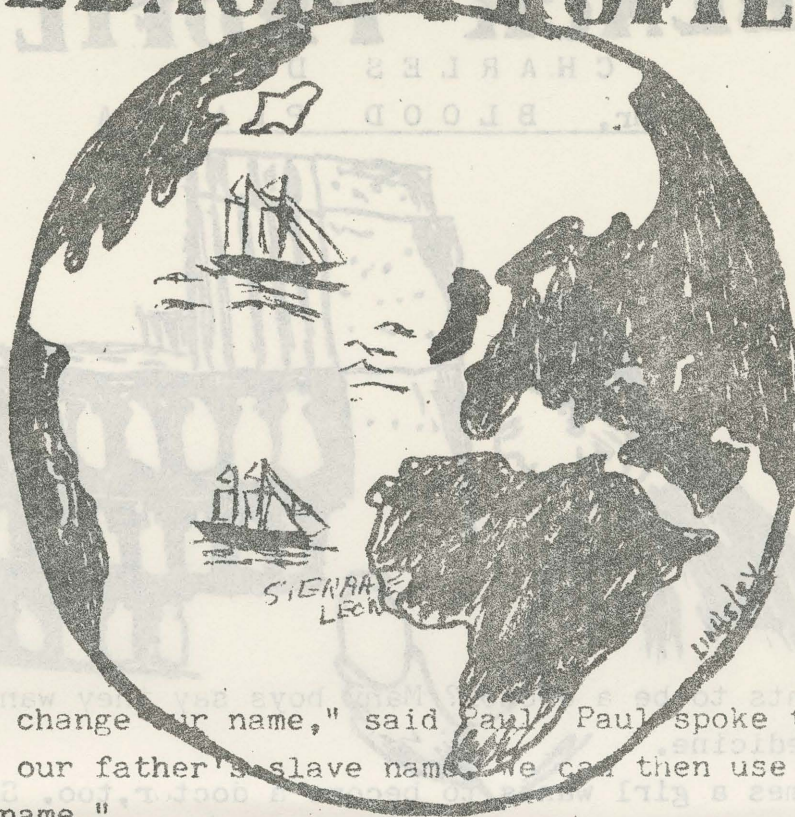
Dr. Drew directed the first American Red Cross Blood Bank. He helped the U.S. Army, also.

BLACK HERITAGE

BLACKS; DIE FOR AMERICA; BUT NO EQUAL RIGHTS

We are all guaranteed equal rights supposedly by the Constitution, and blacks were also supposed to have been granted full rights and total freedom after the Civil War. But not true, America has continually reneged on its promises, but has in the past and now in the future called on blacks to fight and give their lives for a country that still somewhat considers them both sub-human and not worthy of that which is supposed to be rightfully theirs, equal rights. From the Revolutionary War, where blacks were inducted to take the place of their slave masters, to World War II, the Korean War, and in the 60's the Vietnam War, blacks were sent to the slaughter for a country that still considers them inferior.

Lets go into this subject a little further:

In the Revolutionary War this country and England both competed for the Negro support, making promises never kept. In fact, there were blacks who fought in the battle of Bunker Hill in 1775. Colonists who were called to serve in the Continental Army could send instead one of their slaves, for whom they received a bounty. During the war many Negroes were promised freedom as a reward for serving in the Continental Army. Many volunteered, however, were returned to bondage after the war. The War of 1812 brought the United States once again into open conflict with Great Britain. Negroes served in two regiments from New York; in the navy, especially with Perry on Lake Erie; and with Jackson at the battle of New Orleans.

When the firing on Fort Sumter marked the beginning of the Civil War, Negroes from both the North and South were anxious to take part in the struggle for freedom. Prominent Negroes, such as William Wells Brown led the movement for full participation of people of color. Early in 1862, Major General David Hunter tried to establish a regiment composed of ex-slaves in South Carolina. After Hunter resigned because his efforts were opposed by the Lincoln administration, his replacement, General Rufus Saxton continued the organization of the 1st South Carolina Volunteers. In 1863 a letter to the editor appeared in the Boston Journal concerning the use of Afro-American troops by the Union Army. Before receiving official command to do so, General David Hunter experimented with the use of Negro soldiers and found them well equipped for the job. Even in the south, where slavery was as much a part of life as eating, Negroes had been used to fight in the Confederate Army. After the tide turned against the South and Lee's army began to suffer extreme losses, an effort was made to recruit negroes for full military participation. Even then they were not considered trustworthy, because at this time the Confederate Congress were debating the advisability of arming negroes.

Blacks also served in the Spanish American War, but World War I found Negroes serving in France with American Expeditionary Forces. Seven years after the war drew to a close, discussion was still being conducted on their abilities as soldiers. Another slap in the face, yet they took no note of black lives lost. The thread of racism is woven into the cloth of United States history. With the advent of World War II, Negro soldiers were drafted along with whites. There was discrimination in the draft system, however, which resulted in a case reaching the United States Supreme Court on appeal. The Winifred William Lynn V. Colonel John Downer, Commanding Officer, ca

Upton, New York. The plea was made that Negroes were being illegally drafted under a "Jim Crow" system that set their names apart from the white potential inductees and selected them on a quota basis. According to the Select Service Act, no one was to be discriminated against "because of his race, creed or color. In 1948, President Truman issued a proclamation desegregating the armed forces, and the dual system was abandoned.

Wilkes--who claimed to have been attracted by the ringing of the alarm clock--a fatal mistake, since du Motier who was dead would not have set the alarm.

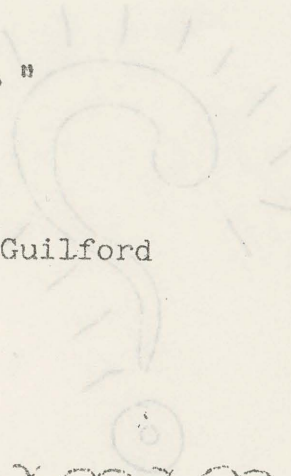

"After getting his patient, the peddler, to keep his mouth shut, Doc cuts a length of rail about six feet long from his bamboo fence.

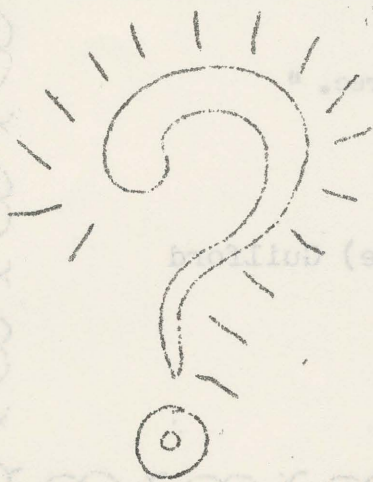
He tells Jim to sit in the creek and breathe through the hollow bamboo, which is maybe as big around as a two-bit piece.

"He didn't panic," corrected Haledjian. "He was murdered."

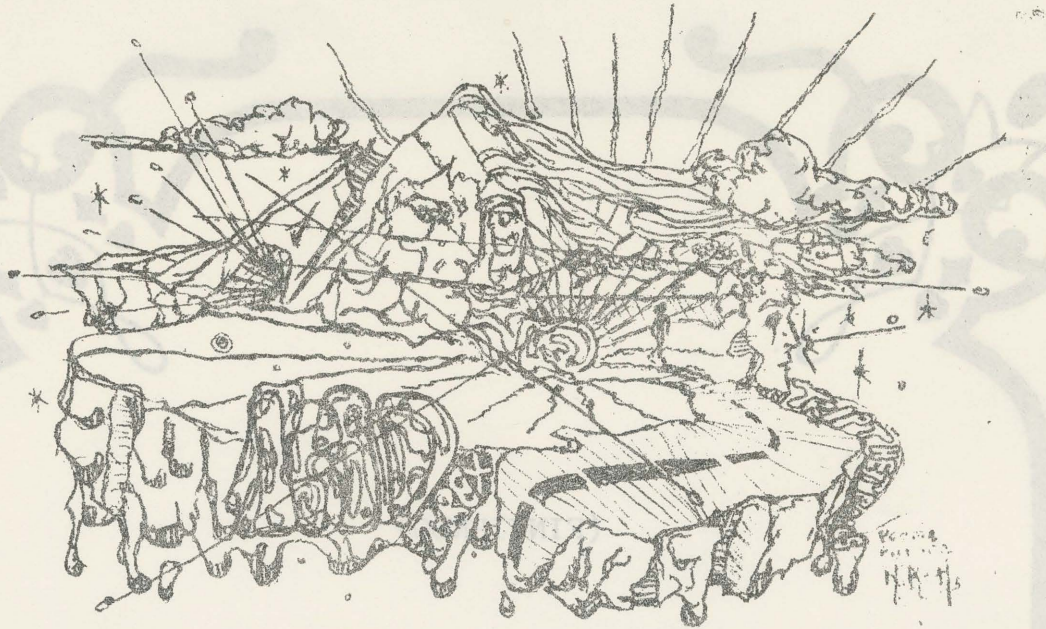

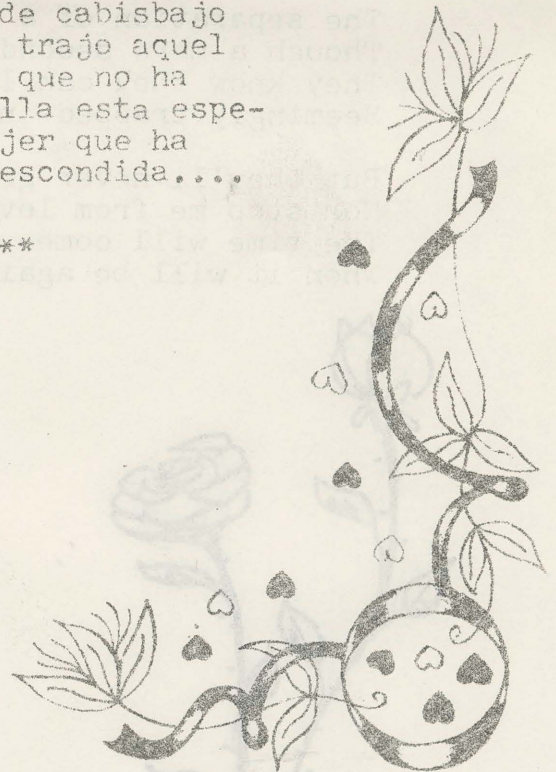




PARA MI QUERIDA

Enfermedades venereas:

SIFILIS

Es causada porpequeñas bacterias en forma de sacacorchos llamadas:"Espiروquetas".Viven en los medios tibios y humedos de los canales genitales,el recto y la boca,pero mueren inmediatamente que dejan el cuerpo humano.La infeccion se desarrolla por contacto sexual, en el pene,la lengua,los dedos y cualquiera que sea el organo receptor.Sifilis ocasionales ocurren por contacto no sexual(dentistas y medicos);pero no puede no se contagia por medios físicos como sillas banos,toallas,tazas,etc. Puede ser heredadas de una madre infectada y puede traer como consecuencias el nacimiento de ninos deformes o con enfermedades que se desarrollan posteriormente.

Encubación

Tiene un periodo de encubacion de aproximadamente 3 semanas y los germenos pueden multiplicarse hasta 200 millones.Si el enfermo no es tratado a tiempo,la enfermedad puede invadir el cuerpo entero causando en ocasiones la muerte. La Sifilis,tiene 4 etapas,cada una presenta síntomas típicos,pero estos pueden variar.

El primer síntoma aparece en la parte que ha estado en contacto con la persona infectada: genitales, recto, boca. Una mancha aparece y crece hasta convertirse en una herida que supura un líquido incoloro. Esta herida es parecida a un botón: redonda, dura y de $\frac{1}{2}$ pulgada de diametro. Pasada una semana, los ganglios se inflaman pero no duelen y por ello pasan desapercibidos. No hay dolores que denuncien la enfermedad.

Segunda Etapa:

Ocurre cuando la bacteria se ha regado por todo el cuerpo. Puede seguir inmediatamente los síntomas de la primera etapa o demorarse varias semanas. La persona comienza a sentirse mal, aparecen los dolores de cabeza, perdida del apetito, dolores en el cuerpo y fiebre alta. La piel se rompe y aparecen unas manchas rojas que permanecen por semanas y hasta meses. Estas manchas aparecen en la parte posterior de las piernas, en los brazos, en la cara, en las manos y en los pies; no producen raspiñas y solo parecen problemas de la piel. Otros síntomas pueden incluir: caída del cabello, heridas en la boca, en la nariz, en la garganta y en los genitales. Todos estos síntomas desaparecen eventualmente sin tratamiento en un periodo de 3 semanas a 3 meses.

Etapa Latente:

Puede demorar desde unos pocos meses hasta unos 50 años. No muestra síntomas. Después de los 2 primeros años, la persona deja de ser infecciosa. La presencia de la enfermedad puede ser detectada por exámenes de la sangre.

Tercera Etapa:

Ocurre en aproximadamente $\frac{1}{4}$ de todos aquellos que no han recibido ningun tratamiento medico. La enfermedad se manifiesta en forma concentrada y va dañando paulatinamente una o varias partes del cuerpo. Las ulceraciones de la piel son comunes. Puede en esta etapa afectar el corazon, la sangre, el sistema nervioso; puede tambien en esta etapa cegar, enloquecer, paralizar o matar al enfermo.

Tratamiento:

Se trata la enfermedad con antibioticos generalmente penicilina; en las primeras dos etapas el tratamiento cura completamente la mayoría de los casos. Exámenes y pruebas de laboratorio demoran con frecuencia mas de dos semanas con el fin de asegurar que la enfermedad este completamente curada. En la etapa latente y hasta la tercera, la sífilis puede erradicarse y prevenir danos posteriores; pero cuando la enfermedad entra en la etapa terciaria los danos posteriores son inevitables.

Singing out of tune in North Carolina is against the law.

The laws of Portland, Me., do not allow one to tickle a girl under the chin with a feather duster.

A New York judge ruled that if two people behind you in a movie house are discussing the probable outcome of a film, you can give them a Bronx cheer.

It is illegal to lasso a fish in Knoxville, Tenn.

In Denver, Colo., the law insists that dogcatchers notify dogs of impounding by posting a notice on a tree in the park.

The law forbids women in Oxford, Ohio, to undress in front of the photograph of a man.

In Cold Spring, Pa., liquor can be sold to a married man only if he has his wife's permission.

In Connecticut, the law states that if you are a beaver, you have a legal right to build a dam.

The legal punishment in Minneapolis, Minn., for double-parking is being put on a chain gang and fed only on a diet of bread and water.

In Roderfield, W. Va., only babies are allowed to ride in baby carriages.

You are not permitted to swim on dry land in Santa Ana, Calif.

An old ordinance of New London, Conn., forbids actresses from appearing in public.

Nongonococcal Urethritis (NGU)

Inflammation of urethra, cervix, uterus, scrotum, rectum, eyelids, inner ear, infant pneumonia, trachoma; a suspected cause of liver infection, Reiter's disease and fetal and neonatal mortality.

Ureaplasma urealyticum—causes about 30% of NGU

Inflammation of urethra, fetus amniotic sac and connective tissues; a suspected cause of low birth weight.

Mycoplasma hominis—causes 10-20% of NGU

Postpartum fever, pelvic inflammatory disease.

Syphilis
Treponema pallidum

Disease mimics many chronic health conditions (called "the great imitator"). In early stages may cause various sores or rashes on the skin or mucous membranes, or swollen lymph glands. Late untreated symptoms include damage to nervous, ocular, cardiovascular systems, tumors, birth defects, insanity.

Chancroid
Hemophilus ducreyi

Genital ulcerations, inflammation and swelling of groin glands.

Granuloma Inguinale
Calymmatobacterium granulomatis

Genital bumps and ulcerations; swelling of lymph glands.

Lympho-granuloma Venereum
Chlamydia trachomatis—

Swollen lymph nodes and ulcerations, enlargement of sexual organs (elephantiasis), rectal stricture. Causes different disease symptoms; usually found in tropical areas.

Shigellosis
Shigella sonnei

Intestinal inflammation, dysentery, largely spread by unhygienic practices, contaminated food or water or sexual-anal practices—especially among homosexual men.

Gardnerella Vaginitis
Gardnerella vaginalis

Inflammation of vagina.

? **Group B beta-hemolytic streptococcus**
Group B beta-hemolytic streptococcus

Early-onset blood infection of newborn; neonatal meningitis and other late-onset syndromes.

VIRAL

Genital Herpes
Herpes simplex virus, usually type 2 but sometimes type 1

Primary and recurring genital blisters, aseptic meningitis, infection of newborn with associated disorders and mortality; suspected cause of cancer of cervix, spontaneous abortion and premature delivery.

Hepatitis B virus

Inflammation of liver, jaundice; largely spread by unhygienic practices, contaminated food or water or sexual-anal practices—especially among homosexual men.

Genital (Venereal) Warts
Condyloma acuminata

Location may vary. Disfigurement, benign warts in children, subject to irritation and secondary infection. Can obstruct urinary and defecatory processes.

Molluscum Contagiosum
Molluscum contagiosum virus

Mild chronic disease characterized by small nodules with curdlike contents.

? **Cytomegalovirus**
Cytomegalovirus

Congenital infections; gross birth defects and infant mortality; mental retardation, deafness; suspected as inflammator of cervix

Trichomoniasis
Trichomonas vaginalis

Inflammation of vagina and various glands and tubes in the reproductive and urinary system; also spread by contaminated water.

Amebiasis
Entamoeba histolytica

Amebic dysentery; largely spread by unhygienic practices, contaminated food or water or sexual-anal practices—especially among homosexual men.

Giardiasis
Giardia lamblia

Diarrhea, pain, distension of stomach, intestinal malabsorption and ulceration; largely spread by unhygienic practices, contaminated food or water or sexual-anal practices—especially among homosexual men.

Other New STD Threats

Three other newly recognized threats to infected persons and infants also need to be mentioned.

Two of these disease organisms are somewhat controversial, not because there is any doubt about their devastating effects on the newborn, but because evidence for venereal transmission is less certain than for other STDs. Whatever the mode of transmission, half of infants who develop severe early-onset infections die, and survivors face blindness, deafness, mental retardation or cerebral palsy.

Another large cause of urethritis, in addition to chlamydia, implicates bacteria that act differently from other bacteria but aren't viruses either. These little understood organisms go by the technical name of *T-strain mycoplasma* (also called ureaplasma): T-strains are known to be sexually transmitted. Unfortunately, most doctors' offices are not set up to do screening tests for either chlamydia or T-strains.

Super-Gonorrhea Worry

The first totally penicillin-resistant strain of gonorrhea was discovered in the United States in early 1976. Since then, promiscuous sexual behavior has spread it to all regions of the nation.

Health officials around the world are becoming worried as more and more strains of gonorrhea become resistant to all but the most powerful and expensive antibiotics. "All our steel-capped bullets are turning into rubber," laments one health official.

Medical officials face a serious dilemma in treating the effects rather than the causes. On one hand there is increasing demand for treatment of serious STDs. On the other, recession and inflation have squeezed and cut health department budgets.

Penicillin-resistant gonorrhea

not only is overwhelming health officials' first line of defense drug (penicillin costs about \$1 to \$2 a dose), but it is also overwhelming the second line of defense drug, spectinomycin (around \$5 a dose). In such cases health officials are forced to rely on even more powerful and expensive antibiotics such as cefoxitin (\$8 a dose).

Another disturbing finding amplifies man's futility in trying to control STD epidemics by treating the effects and not the causes. It was thought that most males with a gonorrhea infection manifested early symptoms so they would seek treatment. Many new studies, however, show that between 15 to as much as 50 percent or even more of males infected with gonorrhea are asymptomatic—that is, they do not manifest early symptoms but are spreading the disease.

It has been early symptoms in males who seek treatment that has been the principal way health officials trace and treat their female partners—80 percent of whom commonly do not show early infectious gonorrhea symptoms.

The folly and danger of promiscuous and careless sex are far greater than anyone ever imagined. Many individuals have kidded themselves that their sexual activity doesn't fit the promiscuous mold. They try to redefine promiscuity to make themselves feel better for not being truly monogamous or faithful. They feel they are not promiscuous because they are not having indiscriminate sex with many partners, but only sex with one or two "special" partners.

Health officials, however, report many boys and girls, and men and women, pick up their STD infections after sexual relations with one of these "special" partners. In most cases, the infection was picked up because one of these partners had picked up an STD infection somewhere else at some other time.

Syphilis Too

Another trend disturbing health officials is the 30 percent increase in reported cases of primary and secondary syphilis between 1977 and 1980 in the United States. Also worrying scientists are developments indicating that the syphilis

spirochete (spy-ro-keet) may also be in the process of developing immunity to penicillin and other antibiotics. So far it hasn't happened. But researchers note changes in the syphilis organism that could produce this effect.

Untreated, syphilis can cause nerve, brain or heart damage, or blindness or a host of other serious health problems—including horrible birth defects in babies of infected mothers.

Spiraling Homosexual STDs

A soaring STD crisis is occurring among homosexuals, especially in urban areas with large homosexual populations, such as San Francisco, California. Selma Dritz, of the San Francisco Department of Health, said: "With the relaxation of traditional moral restraints and the emergence of more permissive modes of social and sexual interplay in the past 10 years, some major cities have acquired large, highly visible homosexual communities. The frequent practices of oral and anal intercourse has been accompanied by reports of rapidly increasing incidence of venereal diseases, venereal herpes, and enteric [intestinal] diseases."

Whenever an STD or other communicable disease is introduced into a promiscuous group it proliferates like wildfire. British and American doctors report the serious viral diseases hepatitis A and B, which cause jaundice and liver failure, are increasing rapidly among homosexuals. Some health authorities estimate syphilis and hepatitis are 10 or more times more frequent among homosexuals than among heterosexuals because of the nature of homosexual practices.

Protect Yourself

Some who have been indiscriminate in their sexual lives may have picked up a serious STD infection that now lies inactive or unnoticed; that infection can rekindle and infect a faithful mate or innocent children!

In truth I want you to know that I, the Lord, am the only one who never changes. In my attitude toward you I am always on your side I am always pulling for you. So, if I were in your shoes I would mind my own business among the locals. Play it cool and just wait for the day when you will be brought to trial, it will eventually come. 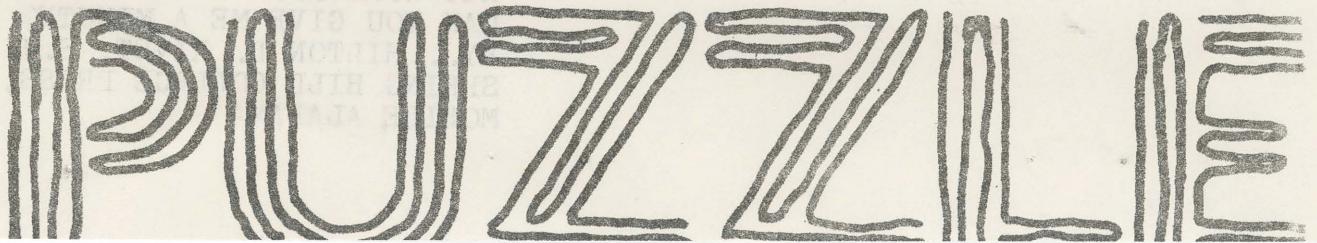
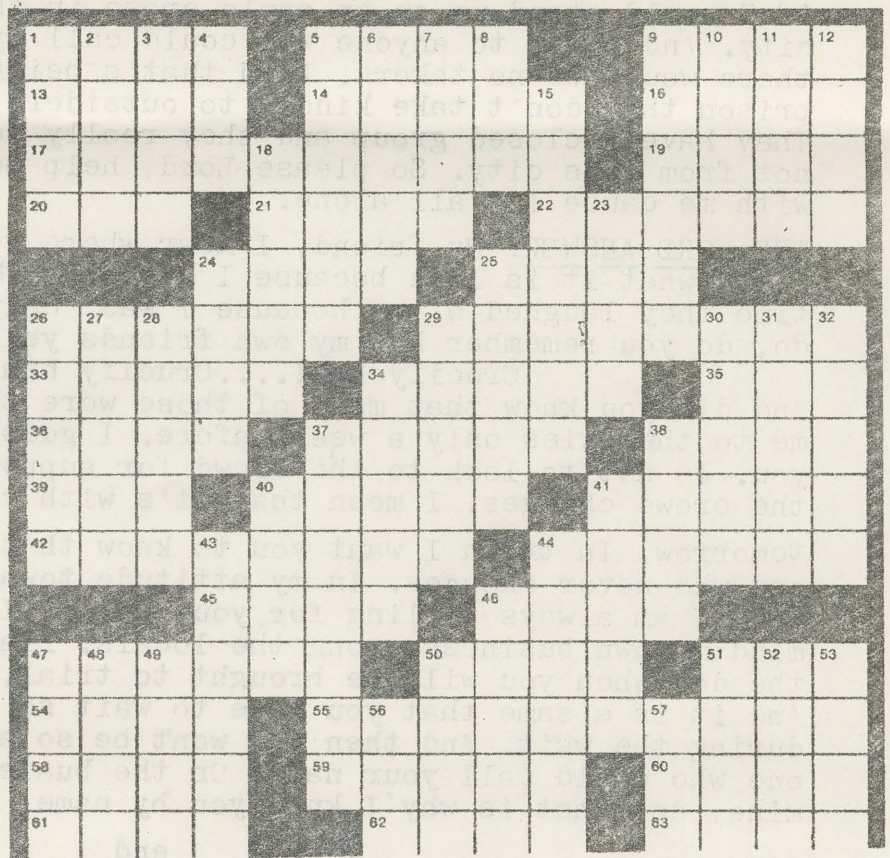

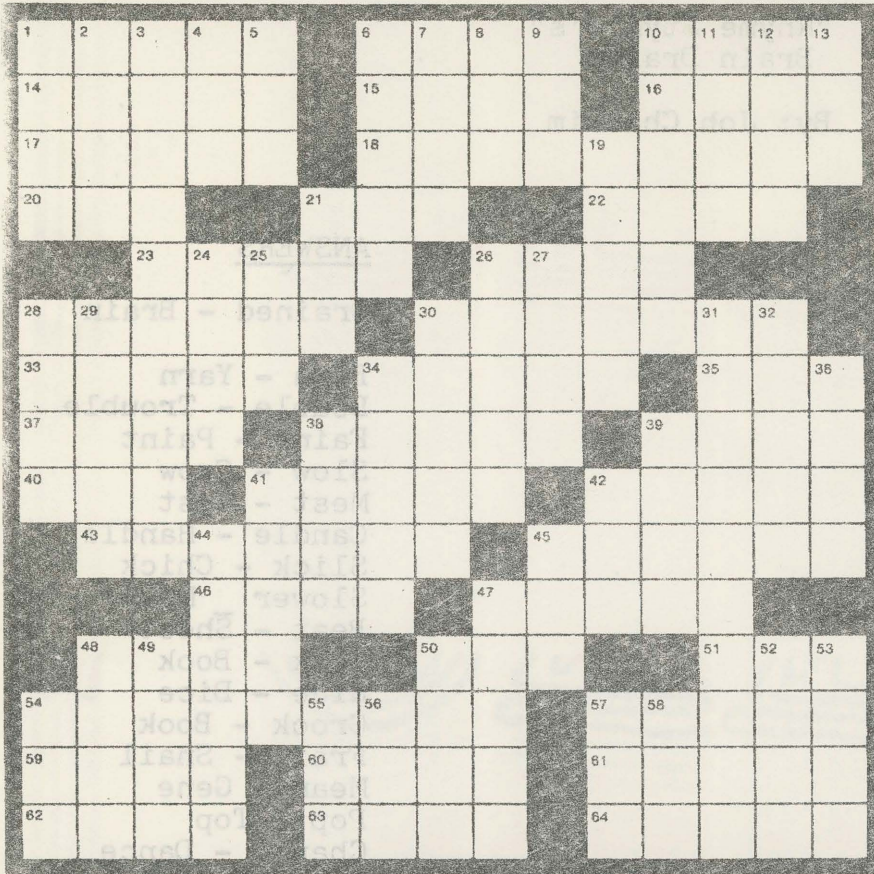
