Dear Prison Store Friend:
This past year the Prison Store has had both a productive and exciting period. Specifically:

1) Thus far we have returned $\$ 75,000$ to 275 men and women in ten state correctional facilities.
2) In order to broaden our working relationship with the Department of Correction, a formal written agreement was signed with the Parole Department. Our intent is to offer the services of the Store to men and women once they have left the institution.
3) As can be seen in our enclosed Summary of Income and Expenditures, the Store this past fiscal year was $32 \%$ self-supporting for our operating expenses (excluding monies for advertising and equipment given to CCIE). This continues to be made possibile by the $10 \%$ service charge donated by the participating inmates and by the $10 \%$ sur-charge paid by our customers.
4) The Department of Correction continues to be most responsive and supportive of the Store in financial and other very meaningful ways. To date we have received some $\$ 12,000$ from contractual agreements from this state agency.
5) The Hartford Foundation for Public Giving granted monies over a three year period, for the purposes of increasing the visibility of the Store via a public awareness program. This past year was our second year under this grant. Because of the monies granted for this purpose, we feel the Store has greatly enhanced its overall public education efforts.
6) We are continuing in our efforts to explore the possibility of assisting in creating a hobby shop program in a correctional facility.
7) Through our outreach program, several pieces of machinery were installed at the Enfield Prison this past fall. Thus far we have been able to provide $\$ 6,000$ for needed woodworking machines for the hobby shops at Enfield and Comers.
8) We have enclosed a copy of our latest financial statement, indi-
rating our income and expenses incurred this past year.
We feel this past year has been one where we have continued to make important contributions in helping others. To all of the people who have continued to make the Storee possible as well as help it grow, we thank you for your support.

WASHINGTON - The Supreme Court heard the arguments on "double-celling" last Monday and, one of these days, will be deciding whether the placing of two convicted criminals in the same cell in Lucasville, Ohio, is a violation of the Constitution of the United States.

And, during the week, a federal judge on Long Island ruled that the Nassain County Jail was overcrowded and ordered the county and the state of New York to reduce the jail population of 930 by half within 60 days.

He didn't care how they did it - just do it!
And, same week, the Department of Justice peutioned a federal judge in Houston to order the Texas Department of Corrections to end the practice of putting two inmates together by 1993. The feds also want to limit the jurisdiction of state wardens to a maximum of 500 inmates and to immediately eliminate "triple-celling."

Same week, again, the New York State Commission of Correction amnounced that it was prepared to go - where else? - to federal court to force New Yark City to reduce jail overcrowding. The city has 9,243 prisoners in facilities designed for 8,300 .

All of this governmental action is based on and presumably will be decided by interpretations of
-the Eighth Amendment to the Constitution: "Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and umsual punishments inflicted."

I am tempted to follow my gut instincts and say that it's getting to the point where the courts might rule that it's cruel to force criminals to make their own beds. But, of course, there is a history of cruelty to convicts and a need to protect their rights, which are really all our rights. Fifty years after the Eighth Amendment was written, American convicts were routinely kept in chains in Cincinnati and forced to sleep with hogs in New Orleans.

So, we have to do this. But why the courts? Because our elected officials - our executives and leg. islators - are so pathetic in Ohio and New York and Texas and a lot of other places. Governors and mayors, legislators and councils have refused to deal with prison issues. There seems to be no great constituency for spending more money on jails even if it might mean less crime, and the federal courts have taken over.

What should be a poltical question - what kind of punishment do we want for crime? - has become a legal question to be decided on the narrow basis of a few words written in the 18th century to prevent the use of torture.

## With these foolish results:

- Judicial decisions tend to favor criminals, who are, after all, the people the Eighth Amendment was written to protect.
- Criminals, dangerous ones, are being set free or never sent to overcrowded prisons at all to satisfy judicial orders and guidelines.

Letting crooks go is a lot cheaper and easier for a governor - than building more cells.

- The current overcrowding and the judicial reaction to it could force many states to build prisons hat will be unnecessary before they are completed. One thing we know about crime is that it tends to be proportional to the number of young males in a society, and we may be experiencing the peak of the crimes committed by all the young men of the "baby


## Wide Variety in Prison Sentences, Study Shows

WASHINGTON - Convicted rapists in 16 states served less time behind bars than the average auto thief jailed in West Virginia.

In California, female murderers spent less than half the time in prison than did males.
In South Carolina, the average convicted robber was imprisoned for 46 months heavier sentences than murderers served in six states.
These findings, in a study of 1976-77 parole data that was published recently by the Na tional Law Journal, point up the sharp variations in the leng th of time that felons serve in prison, which depend on where they broke the law.
The differences suggest that criminals would be well advised to use more care in deciding in what state they murder, rob or rape than what kind of crime they commit.

Unlike earlier studies that examined the prison terms meted out by judges, the newspaper focused on prison terms actually served.

According to the study, which covered 37 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, felons in California served 30 months in prison, five months longer than the national average. Actual prison time was even longer in California because the state figures used in the study represented median time served, generally about one-third lower than the average times reported by other states.

Of the eight felonies tabulated, only persons convicted of forcible rape in California spent less time in jail than the national average - 47 months versus the national average of 52 months.

For all felonies, the average time served ranged from Massachusetts' high of 53 months to South Dakota's low of 13 months. The Massachusetts figure reflected that state's stiff sentences for murder - an average of more than 15 years of actual prison time.
Both sex and race apparently influence the length of time a prisoner remains incarcerated. Only 20 percent of the women paroled in 1977 stayed longer than two years in prison, while 30 percent of the men prisoners did.
California reported a median time served of 20 months for women, compared to 30 months for men. Convicted women murderers in California served a median prison sentence of 30 months, while men were held for 76 months.

He was given basic training in the $3 R^{\prime}$ 's by his mother. He Studied and mastered Arabic, the language of the quran, under Prom fessor Jamil Diab and Kuhammad Abdullah and through self-study.

Thile enriching himself in Spiritual discipiine and studies, W.D. Nuhammad, the adolescent and young man, earned a living via a wide range of employment experlences. He worked on various jobs, picking up junk with Pioneer members Eros. Alphonzo and Sam), as a painter, a poultry dresser, a window washer, delivered telephone books, cleaned carpets and furniture, grocery store and restaurant manacement and was eventuolly employed as a welder for Sethlehem Stee之, U.S. stee1 and International Uarvester. He operated his own bookstore and expresced his leadership capabilities by serving as Lieutenant in the Fruit of Islam
(the then-male training class of the Nation of Islam) and as a minister and Arabic teacher under the leadership of his father.
\#is cultural preference and taste draws from even wider ranges. From Dizzy Giliespie Duke Ellington and Nat King cole to country-western and the oldfashioned biues of íuddy Vaters and Joe Villiams. From Arsbic Poet Iqbai to Fredrick Douglas, Marcus Garvey, Franz Fanon, $\because \because \Xi$.E. DuRois, Edwin C. Eerry and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
W.D. Muhammad's further educational studies took him to Wilson Jr. College where he concentrated in microbiology and Loop Jr. College where he studied English, History and the Social Sciences. But the greatest challenge to his youthful convictions came in 1960 when, in response to the United States ${ }^{\text {d }}$ draft, the young religious teacher pleaded as a "Conscientious objector" and served fourteen months in the Federal Correctional Institution at Sandstone, Minnesota. He seized the time to engage in intensive religious studies.

In 1967, Imam Muhammad made Hajj -his first- (Pilgrimage to Mecca) and later two Umra's (out of season Pilgrimage).

On February 25, 1975, The sudien death of his father, Honorable Elijah Nuhammad (peace be upon him) thrust N.D. Muhammad into leadership over the largest indentifiable Vusiim community in the Western Hemisphere. Despite numerous foretellings of violence, calamity and doom by the press news analysis, Imam Nuhammad (married and father of five children) masterfully assumed 1 eadership and began to engineer a series of fundamental conceptual changes that reconstruted the nature and character of the Nation of Islam.

He debuked all forms of racism, encouraged participation by women in social decisionmaking, separated business from religion and brought the Nation of Islam (which he renamed the World Community of A1-Islam in the West) fully in line with Orthodox Islam and into great prominence as a social reformation movement.

His sensitive leadership, profound social commentary on major issues, his piercing scriptural insight into the Eible, Torah and Zuran, and his unique ability to apply scriptural interpretation to
social issues have attained numerous awards and high honors including: The Nalter Reuther Humanitarium Award, numerous proclamations from mayors and government officials and the Four Freedoms Award, among the recipients, John $F$. Kennedy, Eleanor Roosevelt and Dr. Ralph Bunche.

He has traveled extensively as a personal guest of Egytian President Anwar Sadat, Prime Minister Forbes Eurhan of Guyana, King Khalad of Saudi Arabia. He has entertained foreign heads of state including the ruler of Shariah in the United Arat Emirate: and visited the antiauities of Vucatan and the Middie East.

## VISIT TO PEOPLES'REPURIIC CHTNA

Imam Muhammad toured the Peoples' Pepublic of China for three weeks in October of ' 76 as a member of the "Leaders of National Crganizations" tour of the U.S. China Priendship Association. Mr Muhammad was the glest of honor at banauets given by the government of the Peoples" Repubiic of China in the cities of peking, Nanking and Canton. Other cities visited were Nanning, Kewilin and Shanghai. The tour was made at the height of the peoples' demonstrations against the wife of the late Chairman Mao Tsg-Tung and her three associaties.

## ATTENDS INAUGURATION CERNONY

For the first time in the history of the Nation of Islam (now the American Muslim Mission), the ieader was invited to attend the Inauguration Ceremony of the President of tne United States. The Honorable Warith Deen Muhammad attended the Inauguration Ceremony of President Jimmy Carter on January 20, 1977.

Lecturing frequent1y on college campuses, the unique leadership of Imam Nuhammad at once embodies the spirit of the evangelist and the scholar. Perhaps his mission can be summed up in his words during a CBS news interveiw with Ramdy Daniels: "We want to show those people who are really interested in what we are doing and who like it, and who see the value in it, that we do have an alternative. Exemplary Projects from the National Institute of Justice

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Note to the Reader: (inmates)
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Connecticut has taken their cue from the state of California in many instances and has adopted many policies that have tended to upgrade the prisoner's standard of living. I hope that Corrections Commissioner John Manson will adopt the following program in order to achieve a higher form of understanding for all who work and live in an incarcerated environment.

Ward Grievance Procedure, California Youth Authority
(September 1975)
Left unresolved, even minor problems can fester within the confines of a prison, spawning hostility and even open confrontation between inmates and staff. To alleviate the problem, the California Youth Authority has created a formal but easy-to-use method for resolving inmate grievances in California's youth institutions. Both wards (inmates) and staff participate in the procedure, which works in this way:

Ayy inmate with a grievance is entitled to an open hearing conducted by inmate and staff representatives. If the decision is unsatisfactory the grievant may appeal to higher levels within the Youth Authority, and ultimately ta an outside review panel, chaired by a professional arbitrator. Volunteer arbitrators are identified with the assistance of the American Arbitration Association. At each level, grievances are responded to in writing, within strict time limits.

In the 19 month period from September 1973 to April 1975, 85\% of the cases were resolved, approximately $10 \%$ had been withdrawn prior to the hearing, and another $5 \%$ were still pending at the time of reporting. In $70 \%$ of the cases, the disposition has been in favor of the grievant either totally or through some sort of compromise. Only $24 \%$ of the grievances were denied. In these cases the reasons were clearly set forth in writing, thus clarifying official policy. Most of the grievances are resolved at the first level of review-mthe inmatemstaff committee meeting. Only $2 \%$ of the grievances required outside arbitration.

Training--for inmates, staff, and management-m-is a key to the project's success. Another special feature contributing to it's effectiveness is the involvement of the inmate's them selves. Inmate grievance clerks process complaints, manage paperwork and often represent grievants.

The California Youth Authority's collaborative approach to resolving problems has paid off in terms of effectiveness and acceptance of the grievance procedures. The process has recently been expanded to include parolee as well as inmate grievances.

Bell says Deodato's guidanec since 1979 is that of a "coach." helping to clarify and simplify the band's commercial sound after vecalist James "J.T." Taylor and Earl Toon were added to the previously, all instrumental group.
"At that time, a slow period for us from 1977.78. we were overcreative. locked into the market sound and putting too much into our musie." claims Bell. "We moved the brass into the background and brought the vocals forward."

Bell admits that disco peak cra benefited his group. although the success of that sorund. dictated by such New York stations as WBLS. FM and WKTU-FM, was confining for the diverse talents of the band.

Now air play singles out Koot \& the Gang's crossover potential. which Bell terms "universal," with stations specializing in jazz. pop. rab and country.

## DEAD SPECIAL RATINGS SOAR

NEW YORK The NBC Source 90 -minute Grateful Dead Special. which affliates ran the weekend of Feb. 6-8. has turned out to be the network's most successful special.

Almost 6.2 million listeners tuned the show in. at least to listen to part of it. This cume figure was disclosed in research by R.H. Bruskin in its Omnitel survey in 1.010 telephone interviews a week after the show.

The survey found that $6.9 \%$ of the 18 to 34 year olds in the continental U.S. listened and $80 \%$ of these listeners were men. Among men 18 to 24. the show captured $183 \%$.

The 6.9 rating surpasses a 5.4 rating in that age group scored a Source by Ted Nugeni special last year.
