

MASSACHUSETTS' SCREEN LAW. ome time been in operation in Massachusetts. This law was passed with the idea that if rumsellers were compelled to do business without any screen between them and the public some of the evils of the rum traffic would be lessened. A number of prominent men have just been interviewed

they say indicates that it has had a good ef-L. Edwin Dudley, secretary of the Massachusetts Law and Order league, says that the screen law has served to keep the rumsellers within bounds. It has been particularly beneficial in lessening the evil of selling liquor to children and of Sunday liquor selling, George M. Butrick of the State Temperance alliance says it serves to keep many men from going into barrooms who would do so if it were attended with less publicity. Henry H. Faxon says that the law has done a great amount of good since it went into operation. Thousands of rascalities have been stopped that formerly were perpetrated under cover of the screens. Mr. Faxon says: From the rumseller's standpoint the liquor business cannot be carried on without the aid of screens. Many a time when in the dead hours of the night I have paid an official visit to some rumseller whose place was full of half drunken loafers, they invariably tried to get behind each other so as not to be noticed or recognized, huddling together like a lot of pigs on a cold day, when everyone wants to get the middle place. In making this allusion for compari-

son I mean no disrespect to the pigs. All sorts of devices were used and all kinds of stories told, in order to get up some kind of a screen behind which minors and heads of families who frequent rumshops, together with bummers and drunkards, could hide

Others give similar testimony. But ex-Police Commission r Gargan, of Boston thinks that the screen law has had a damaging effect upon the community because children can look into the saloons and witness scenes which they ought not to witness till they have reached their majority.' In the recent scientific experiments on th ffect of cold two frogs were frozen solid in temperature of about 20" Fahrenhait, and cept in that condition for half an hour. On having slowly they recovered perfectly, but it was found that longer periods of exposure invariably killed the animals. The experinent was tried of freezing hermotically sealed meat, so as to kill its bacterial organisms, and thus render it incapable of putrefying. It was found, however, that so low a tem erature as 80° below zero would not destroy he vitality of micro organisms. It was thus nade clear that the attempts to preserve neat for a long time by the momentary freezng of it must be abandoned.

When one rides through the South in steam cars, says the Atlanta (Georgia) Constitution, comparatively little live stock is seen, but nevertheless one-quarter of the live stock of the country is owned and fed in the South. Texas, of course, helps the other fifeen southern States out, but all the southern States are better off in this respect than s generally thought. The South has \$600,-000,000 invested in milch cows, oxen, other eattle, sheep, hogs, horses and mules. The South owns one-third of the milch cows, oxen, other cattle and hogs of the country, or fully her proportion according to population. One-quarter of the sheep of the country are kept in the South, when ten years ago the roportion was only one-seventh.

The American Humane society at its mee ing held in St. Louis discussed the question f branding cattle on the western plains. The ractice was voted inhuman and a proper ubject of attack by the society. A memorial was drawn up to be presented to th Cattlemen's convention which assembled in the same city shortly afterward, condemning the use of the branding iron as a relic of barbarism. The stockmen, when the resolution of the humanitarian was read to them, totally ignored the subject. The Humane society abandoned the field in disgust. But an unexpected ally to their cause has been found in the person of a Kansas stock-raiser who in the course of a speech to the cattlemen remarked incidentally that the present system of branding was injurious to the hide of the animal. He advised that the cabalistic devices be made smaller in future. Among other interesting matters discusse

at the recent meeting in Washington of the ederation of Labor Unions was the practice "boycotting." The committee on resoluions reported a declaration on the subject, setting forth the fact that the remedy of the poycott has been so grossly abused as to enlanger its usefulness, local organizations renstances trying to boycott establishments employing union men. In view of this the ommittee recommended the adoption of a esolution declaring that the Federation disountenances such proceedings and deplores countenances such proceedings and deplores them on account of the odium cast upon the working classes and the injury to their interests. Delegate Oyster said he did not know of any instance of abuse in the District of Columbia, but admitted that the boycott should not be resorted to until after every-thing has been done to reach an amicable understanding. Delegate Sharpe, of Philadelphia, pointed out that the boycott sometimes acted as a boomerang—the assailed establishments retaliating by excluding union men entirely from their employment. "A Journal of the Reign of Queen Victo ia from 1837 to 1852," by the late Charles . F. Greville, Esq., clerk of the council, is now published in two volumes by D. Appleton & Co. When the first portion of the Greville memoirs, consisting of a journal of the reign of King George IV, and King William IV., was published in 1874, it was intimated that the continuation of the work was reserved for future publication. Forty-eight years have elapsed since the date at which the narrative of the former volumes was suspended, and the time has arrived when it any be resumed. We are divided by a long ime from the administrations of Lord Melourne, Sir Robert Peel and Lord John Russell, and, with a small number of exceptions, no one survives who sat in the Cabinets of hose statesmen. The incidents and opinions which are found in these volumes derive their chief value from the fact that they are recorded by a by-stander and spectator who was not, and who did not aspire to be, an actor in the occurrences he witnessed, but who lived on terms of intimacy with many of the active politicians of his times in both of the leading parties of the State, although he belonged to neither of them. The offensive statement in full was that the workingmen of New Haven spend four consand dollars every day over the bars for

lrink, which would build at least two good ttages, or six hundred cottages annually. In the United States nine hundred million dollars are spent over the saloon bars for drink-a sum so large that we cannot grasp , and can only get a feeble idea of it by pposing that a person had commenced at e birth of Christ to throw away one dollar each minute, and had continued so to do down to the present time, without stopping to cut, drink or sleep except on Sunday. He would not have thrown away so large a sum as we spend as a nation every year for drink.

And should this money be spent for the necessaries of life there would be a boom in business right away." This is what I did say in Boston, and I have no apology to make for so doing. The estimated amount of money we spend for drink as a nation was obtained from the official reports of the inrnal revenue officers.

The Grand Street Railroad Bridge. was simply an attempt to meet a fanatical spirit in the country on this question to which he would not give his countenance.

Mr. Cockrell offered an amendment to the effect that any Senator or member of Congress violating the rule should be liable to ex-pulsion. It looked small for Senators to be passing rules inflicting punishment on com-mittee clerks for conniving at the use of whiskey in the Capitol when it was notorious that distinguished Senators who voted to keep this rule in kept intoxicating liquors in their committee rooms.
